Reasons a character is important in the story might include:

Change/Growth	Character learns something or changes throughout the story
Accomplishment	Character overcomes challenges and succeeds
Cause/Effect	Character causes important events or influences other characters

Ways to reveal a character's personality traits:

Actions	What does the character do/say?
Motives	Why is the character behaving in a certain way? What is “behind” their actions?
Reactions	How does the character handle situations/conflicts that happen?

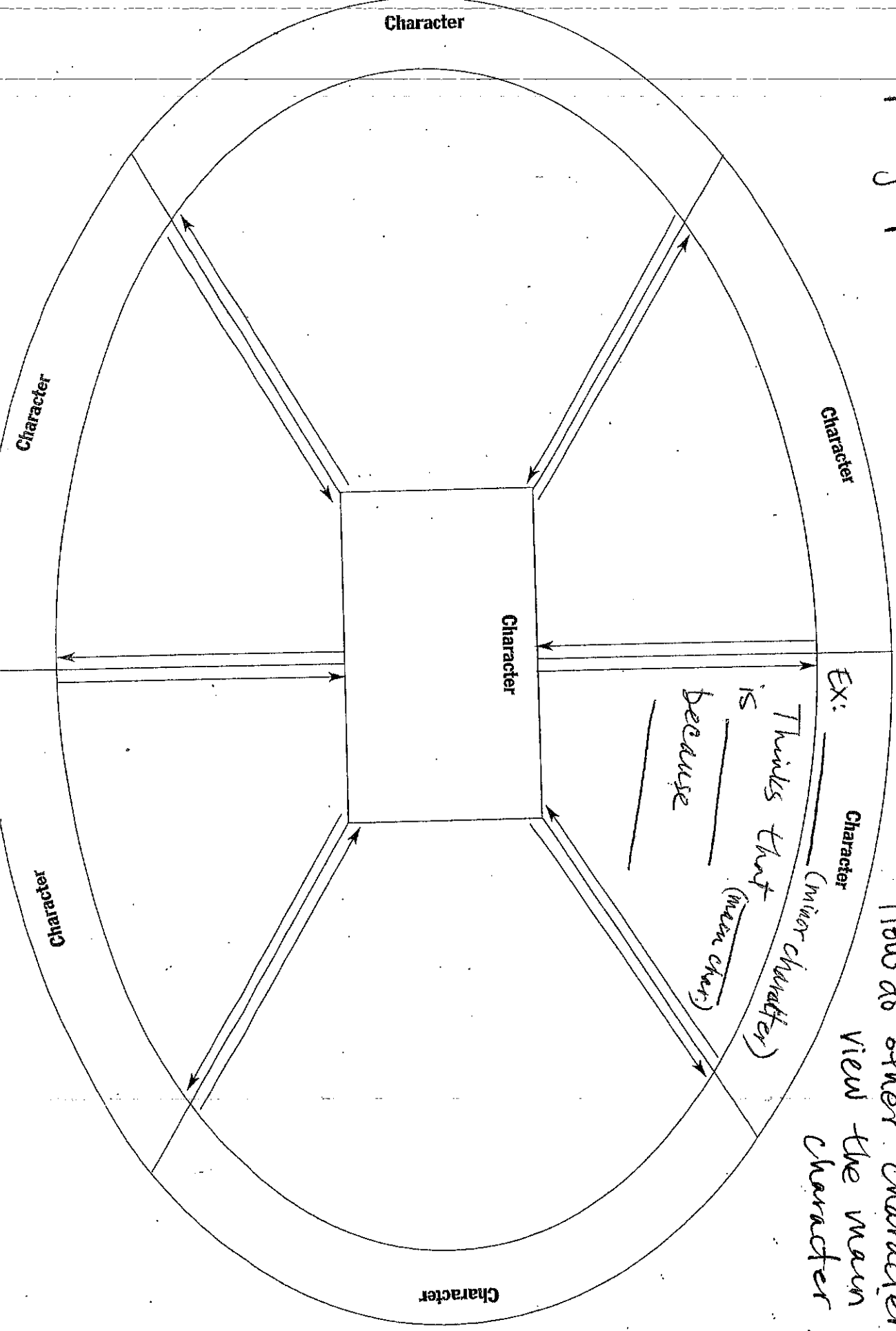
